

The 'plane was used for many years as the USAF advanced jet trainer, and also extensively by NASA astronauts for training and currency. Capable of Mach 1. It is only recently being replaced with a newer trainer.

- 1. Name: David W. H. Hopewell
- 2. How long have you been a member of 1047? 4 years.
- 3. Day job: Retired, although I'm spending two day's a week as a valet at a local car dealer in Rocky Mount.
- 4. What drew you to aviation? T-Bird F-100 performance in mid 60's, Also included was a performance by Bob Hoover in his yellow Mustang. Said to myself "that could be fun."
- 5. Your first solo. Soloed in a USAF T-41 (Cessna 172) at Stinson Field, TX in Oct 1968
- 6. Do you have your pilot's ticket? If yes- for which aircraft? If yes- for which aircraft? Have my ATP for MEL and SEL
- 7. Call sign if you have one. How did you get it? " "Buffy" Previous aircraft.
- 8. Anyone especially memorable you've met through aviation? Chuck Yeager
- 9. Favorite 'plane you've flown? C-123K and B-52 D, F and G.
- 10. Most memorable flight? We'd have to sit down with a couple of soda's and about a day and a half to cover this question. However, my first most memorable flight was a solo T-38 cross country trying to land at Kelly AFB, TX. Being a student I was not allowed to penetrate and clouds because if I did a BIG green hand would reach up from under the plane and get me. (At least that's what my instructor told me. And you should always believe tour instructor!) RAPCON was trying to get me to descend and my seat cushion is starting to disappear when I crossed the most beautiful trough of clouds followed by the edge of the cloud deck and clear WX ahead. I was able to descend and complete my solo with a safe landing.
